
The role of Medicines Advice in managing shortages at Leeds Teaching Hospitals Trust

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Background

In response to the rising number of NHS medicine shortages, a "shortages group" was established to formalise management roles and streamline processes at Leeds Teaching Hospitals Trust (LTHT).

Previously shortages were managed informally by the procurement pharmacist and colleagues from relevant departments. The increasing frequency of shortages however, highlighted the need for a standardised approach. This evolved into structured weekly meetings involving procurement, Medicines Advice, clinical pharmacy, and dispensaries. This poster aims to outline communication-related challenges and how the role of Medicines Advice contributes to addressing these issues.

There's so many shortages, clinical teams are suffering information overload


Key shortages that require a change in practice shared on the Leeds Formulary

Key Learning Points:

- ☐ Medicines shortages are an ongoing issue that must be managed to minimise impact on patients.
- □ Often shortages affect multiple pharmacy areas and require collaboration with clinical teams. At LTHT, the shortages management group became more effective as it expanded to include more areas however, the importance of clarity of roles and responsibilities has increased.
- ☐ The Medicines Advice team provides locally customised information to support implementation of actions and contributes expertise in evidence-based decision making to the shortages management group.
- □ Supporting this work stream required additional resource. From Medicines Advice 0.1 WTE of a pharmacy technician's time and 0.1 WTE of a senior Medicines Advice pharmacist's time was allocated to the project.
